When the chatbots were given the complete picture they were 95% accurate. “They were amazing, actually, nearly perfect,” researcher Prof Adam Mahdi tells me. But it was a very different story when 1,300 people were given a scenario to have a conversation with a chatbot about in order to get a diagnosis and advice. It was the human-AI interaction that made things unravel as the accuracy fell to 35% – two thirds of the time people were getting the wrong diagnosis or care.

You might be thinking: No, humans are different! We are smarter than animals, we are rational beings, we are self-aware, we plan ahead, we are free, we are moral agents. Hence we have rights that other animals do not have, and we are entitled to use other animals as we wish. But, as Bentham pointed out, this argument has the implication that human infants—who are less rational, less self-aware, and less capable of planning ahead than many nonhuman animals—would also lack rights, and we would thus be entitled to use them as we use animals. The same would hold for some humans beyond infancy who, whether from a genetic abnormality, or brain damage, will never match the cognitive capacities of some nonhuman animals. Moreover, a series of studies has shown that differences in mental capacities don't really explain why people give humans moral priority over other animals. On the contrary, when subjects were asked to say whom they would help in a situation in which they must choose between a human and a chimpanzee, 66 percent chose to help the human, even when told that the chimpanzee had more advanced mental capacities than the human.

Because lying takes increased mental effort, some experts on lie detection believe that increasing overall cognitive load may make lying behavior easier to detect in real time because the individual would have fewer cognitive resources to devote to constructing and maintaining a *plausible lie. This cognitive perspective of lie detection suggests an overload should more dramatically increase the amount of time it takes to construct a convincing lie, as compared to when an individual is telling the truth. ① However, most adults have a truth bias and can only detect deception about 50 percent of the time or at about chance levels. ② To overload mental resources, interviewers may ask people to complete additional tasks while being interviewed or **interrogated. ③ They may also add time pressure by asking the person to answer the questions quickly, increase stress, or increase the intensity of ***physiological cues such as tiredness or hunger. ④ All of these extra stressors increase demands on mental effort, which should increase the differences in response times between lying and honest responses.

In a powerful demonstration of the extent to which confidence sways juries, psychologist Gary Wells and his colleagues conducted an *elaborate experiment that resembled the entire criminal law process, from the initial witnessing of a crime to the jury's decision on guilt or innocence. First, the researchers staged a crime for each of 108 different subjects: An actor pretended to steal a calculator from the room where each subject was completing some forms. Wells varied the amount of time that the **perpetrator was in the room, how much he said to the subject, and whether he wore a hat (which made his face harder to see). Shortly after the "criminal" left the room, the experimenter entered and asked the subject to select the criminal from a photographic lineup and to state a level of confidence in that selection. Not surprisingly, subjects who had viewed the criminal only briefly were more than twice as likely to make an incorrect selection from the lineup as those who viewed the perpetrator for a long time. Yet they were nearly as confident in their selection as those who saw the perpetrator for a long time.

We must beware of the memorization trap into which so many of us fall. In advance of job interviews or other situations where we'll likely have to speak *spontaneously, it is tempting to have some key lines or talking points nailed down in advance. That way, we'll know just what to say when the time comes. Writing down what we might want to say can help, but memorization also can come back to haunt us. Giving our communication the feel of a formal, over-rehearsed presentation, it can make us more nervous as we struggle to remember a great **zinger that we'd thought of in advance of the actual conversation. We wind up closely examining what we're saying, paying attention to every little ***deviation from our script and framing it as a mistake. Also, by taking valuable mental energy to remember our lines, we inhibit our ability to react naturally to others around us. We have less cognitive capacity at our disposal to listen to others and react in kind. We're in our heads, not where we should be—immersed in the social world.

Loneliness and social isolation are both well-established risk factors for shorter life spans in large *epidemiological studies that carefully follow participants over time. In a study of over 21,000 adults in Denmark, being socially isolated was associated with a 60–70 percent greater likelihood of death over a seven-year period. These effects hold up over even longer stretches of time. In a study of 2,588 men in Finland, social isolation and loneliness predicted mortality over a period of approximately twenty-three years. These findings are particularly striking given rates of loneliness, including in the United States: A 2021 survey by Cigna of US adults found that a stunning 58 percent reported feeling lonely. There are many explanations for why having a larger and stronger social support network supports psychological and physical **resilience. When people feel supported by family and friends, they tend to feel more confident and in better control; more motivated to adopt healthier and less risky behaviors, such as smoking and drinking alcohol; more inclined to use active coping strategies; and less likely to see negative or stressful events as being ***insurmountable.
